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C. Contribution to Science

My contributions have been in community health sciences and prevention sciences, focusing on health disparities, culture, and social determinants of health, with a focus on cancer prevention and control. Historically vulnerable populations defined by socioeconomic status, ethnicity, geography, and risk behaviors, have suffered from wide health disparities that are avoidable. Central findings from my 20 years of research are applied to culturally specific, linguistically and literacy tailored community-based participatory communication intervention. My research has been distributed widely and my public health prevention research has often had health programming and policy implications.

- Communication: Research and evaluation on health education and communication campaigns to optimally convey health information to the public. My central findings show the need for community-based interventions to address issues of low literacy, numeracy, low educational levels, and English proficiency among socioeconomically disadvantaged population groups in priority populations.

Cancer prevention at the community level: My research in this area has focused on collaborations with the Childhood Obesity Research Center (Goran), Children's Hospital Los Angeles and the Young Adult Cancer Survivors Center at USC that influence strategies to offset the overall cancer burden. My central findings have highlighted the need for culturally and language specific intervention that empower at risk families and communities to take action for their health. My findings have been applied to developing empowerment prevention strategies on nutrition and physical activity to combat obesity, working on risk factors for cancer, and its associated factors, and disproportionate risk for certain diseases for African American and Hispanic Americans. This has taken me to work on other concomitant conditions, such as reducing the risk for Type 2-diabetes, and cardiovascular disease in rural, urban groups.

- 4. Combating HPV infection to reduce disparities in cervical cancer: Hispanic/Latinas have one of the highest rates of cervical cancer, and high rates of Human Papillomavirus infections than other population groups. Central findings of my research shows, how cultural and systemic barriers, and fears surrounding cancer, are creating greater disparities among women and how to optimally develop health promotion messages to correct these disparities. This research led to the production of two films Tamale Lesson (narrative) and It's Time (non-narrative) (http://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=-s4fm1 DaAG0). Central findings show Tamale Lesson reduced a disparity in cancer screening in women out of compliance within a six-month period. Our film received prestigious including from the American Public Health Association, Public Health Education and Health Promotion national award in 2013 for most innovative multimedia educational material. The application of this research has resulted in U.S. dissemination to over 800 promotoras de salud, 500 clinical providers, and to 900 jurisdictions in Panama, implementing the video intervention to increase early detection among women.
