



On February 12, 2025, CaRE²'s Community Outreach Core and trainees participated in the University of Florida Health Cancer Center Annual Research Showcase in Gainesville, FL. Our team presented how we prevent fraudulent entries from entering our contact registry and RadTox testing.





On Saturday, February 15th, 2025, our Community Outreach Core team participated in the 8th Annual Head for the Cure 5K in Orlando, FL. The team distributed information on CaRE²upcoming projects and informed the attendees of our contact registry. The event attracted over 600 community members, volunteers, and supporters, of whom 35 stopped to visit our table and 3 signed up for our contact registry!










On Saturday, February 21st, 2025, our Community Outreach Core team participated in the Orlando Magic vs. Memphis Grizzlies basketball game in Orlando, FL. The team distributed information on CaRE², our contact registry, and the RadTox test. The game attracted multiple individuals from diverse ethnic communities, along with volunteers and supporters. A total of 26 people stopped by our table, and 9 signed up for our contact registry!





On Saturday, February 22, 2025, CaRE²graduate research assistant, Abria McNeill, and DrPH volunteer participated in the Harambee Festival in Tallahassee, Florida (Leon County). Over 50 individuals received information regarding cancer prevention, and the importance of participating in research. The Contact Registry form was completed by 40 individuals.



On Thursday, March 6, 2025, CaRE 's COC members Dr. Carolina Aristizabal and Eduardo Ibarra participated in the Feria de Salud at the Consulate of Mexico in Los Angeles. Over 30 community members received cancer prevention information and resources. Three attendees signed up for the Contact Registry.

CONTACT REGISTRY

The purpose of the Contact Registry is to create a list of individuals who are interested in hearing about future research projects led by the CaRE2 Health Equity Center that focuses on learning more about preventing and eliminating

The CaRE2 Center is a tri-institutional partnership with Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University (FAMU), the University of Southern California (USC), and the University of Florida (UF).

If you agree to join the registry you will be required to share your contact information, such as your address, email address, home phone number, cell phone number, and your research participation preferences.

While joining the registry is voluntary, should you agree to be added, you will be required to sign a Privacy Authorization Form.

RadTox™ Test

What is the RadTox™ test?

The **RadTox**TM test measures your blood to see how the tumor is responding to cancer treatment, helping doctors know if the treatment is working.





How can the test help me?

- The RadToxTM test shows how the tumor is responding to cancer treatment.
- It helps your doctor know if the treatment is working.



What does the test measure?

- The RadToxTM Test measures tumor DNA (cfDNA) in your blood after treatment.
- A decrease in cfDNA suggests the tumor is shrinking.



Why is this test important?

- The test helps you and your doctor quickly decide on continuing or changing treatment.
- It shows if the cancer treatment is working in real-time.




What steps can I take?

- 1. Ask your doctor if the RadTox™test is right for you
- 2. Get a blood test (covered by insurance)
- 3. Contact us to get more information about a RadTox[™] test
